HEALING WITH FILM

Reelworld sits down with the filmmakers of "Almost Sunrise" – a film about moral injury and war – to discuss impact and healing communities with film

Over the last five years there has been an upsurge in the number of filmmakers who are turning their lenses to war veterans' issues. There was Ellen Goosenberg Kent in 2013, who took us inside a crisis hotline centre for soldiers in upstate New York in her Academy Award-winning film. "Crisis Hotline: Veterans Press One." Or Laurent Bécue-Renard's "Of Men and War" - a documentary about American soldiers returning home with PTSD that screened at Cannes the following year. Even more recently, screenwriter Alice Winocour made her contribution to the conversation in the drama-thriller "Disorder" (2016) a film about a French soldier who returns from Afghanistan to night sweats, haunting dreams and consuming paranoia and PTSD.

Each of these films has helped shed important light on the trauma of war audiences known best as: post-traumatic stress disorder. But Director

Michael Collins and Canadian producer Marty Syjuco's "Almost Sunrise" might be the first to show us something new.

"Almost Sunrise" explores the concept of moral injury – the deep pain one feels after doing something that goes against internal values and ethics – through American Iraq War veterans Tom Voss and Anthony Anderson. Starting in Wisconsin, the film follows Voss and Anderson as they walk to California in an effort to escape suicidal thoughts and rebuild their lives. Threading interviews with other veterans and family members with scenes of meditation and reflection, the film gives a powerful glimpse into the complexity of modern war and the toll it takes on the spirit.

Our team sat down with Collins and Syjuco to discuss the film, its ambitious impact campaign and a type of suffering the film introduces: moral injury.

What inspired you to make this film?

MICHAEL: The film came about a few years ago when I was doing volunteer work for a veterans' organization. I was flying around the country interviewing vets about their experience with this organization. As I was doing it, I was learning more and more about the issues they were facing and about the issues their families were facing. I felt how disconnected I was from all of that. One thing that shocked me was when

someone casually said that 22 veterans were taking their lives every day. After that experience, I knew that I wanted my next film to be about war veterans' issues.

What goals did you have in mind when you made the film?

MARTY: One of our goals was to educate on moral injury; it's a very new concept. The general public is very familiar with PTSD and everyone says, "Oh you're a veteran or a soldier, you must be suffering PTSD and trauma, but moral injury – which is akin to a wound to the soul – is something very different. A lot of people who come see the films, there's often this "aha" moment: "Moral injury, when you are forced to do things that go against your moral beliefs, like when you're trained to kill like a champion."

Can you elaborate on that?

MICHAEL: Yes. We're taking the conversation to a new place that we're actually spiritual beings and when we send people off to war, the things they have to do in these situations leave wounds on their soul. The only way that they can heal from this stuff is if we come together as a community and take responsibility for it.

When did you know you wanted this film to have an impact campaign?

MICHAEL: I think for us the impact campaign started before we even started shooting. We knew we were making the film because we wanted to make change. We wanted to do a campaign around these issues. We wanted to make it a great film but we knew that the goal was to

then use it as a piece of media in a larger campaign that would start conversations and affect positive change in the world.

How have people reacted to the screenings?

MARTY: Overall, there's been tremendous healing already. Aside from the screening, we always have a thoughtful Q & A after the film and we also end the film with a healing activity. In San Diego (at the GI Film Festival) we (had) a screening on Thursday and a meditation on Friday morning that Tom (lead). Tom has become a meditation teacher and he's dedicated his life to helping other vets; meditation transformed his life at the end of the film. What's been incredible is the turnout to the meditation session or some sort of art therapy activity.

What do you hope you achieve with the screenings?

MICHAEL: We want to bring the military communities and civilian communities together more. Giving someone the opportunity to walk in someone the opportunity to walk in someone's shoes is great but we knew we wanted to create opportunities to take action outside just watching the film itself that would help to bridge this sort of military/civilian divide.

Why is this film important for Canadians to see?

MARTY: For me as a Canadian filmmaker, I'm very proud and honoured to bring our film to Canada, especially Toronto audiences. Toronto always reminds me of New York City: it's cosmopolitan, it's progressive. But also Canada sends troops to war. In every war there is a Canadian contingent. This journey is not just for Americans.



Based on the story of da Silveira's life, Nise follows this young crusading doctor through her attempts to reform psychiatric treatment in 1940s Brazil. Fresh out of prison after being charged with communism, da Silveira (played by famous telenovela actress, Glória Pires) became one of the first doctors to introduce painting and pet therapy as an alternative form of treatment for schizophrenia. Influenced largely by Carl Jung, da Silveira held the unpopular belief that giving creative opportunities to people with mental health issues could bring out their best potential and helped to produce some of Brazil's best modern artists.
